## **CLASS: CORN**

1. Largest sweet corn cob
2. Largest forage corn cob
3. Best decorated corn cob

## **CLASS: OLDEN DAYS TO MODERN WAYS**

13. **Collection of Heirloom Vegetables**, 3 types, 3 of each. Must include variety name. The term "heirloom" is often associated with tomatoes, but the word may also be applied to any open-pollinated fruits, vegetables, and flowers that were introduced at least 50 years ago. Open-pollination occurs when bees and other natural pollinators fertilize the plants. Heirlooms come with long histories and have been grown for many years and are often passed down from generation to generation.
14. **Two House Plants**, one variety popular at least 70 years ago, and one variety popular today.
15. **Preservation Basket** containing at least 5 and no more than 8 food items that use a variety of preservation methods. Will be judged on presentation, variety of items, quality, and description of items.
16. **Old Fashioned Beehive**, a traditional, older-style residence no longer used.
17. **Two Kitchen Utensils**, one at least 70 years old, and a modern equivalent.
18. **Two Bathing Suits**, one in a style of at least 70 years ago, and one in a style of today.
19. **No Sew Pioneer Rag Doll (age 13-17)**
20. **No Sew Pioneer Rag Doll (age 6-12)**

21. **Punched Tin Craft** made of tin cans, tin lids, or disposable light aluminum bakeware. Most kitchenware in North America was made of tin until around the 1920s. Some of these items included pots and pans, coffee pots, plates, boxes, cookie cutters, and lanterns. Tin Punching was a craft introduced by Europeans to make tinware more decorative (i.e. patterns) and functional (i.e. in lanterns to reduce drafts, and 'pie cabinets' to allow better air circulation around food and to keep insects away).
22. **Whittling**, sculpting wood with nothing more than a knife.
23. **"Then and Now" Photographs**, enter two photos of the same subject, each showing traits of two different time periods circa 1900 and 2023. Entries must be 5"x 7" or 8"x 10". Photographs must be framed with matte board, black or white only. Matte board must not be greater than 2" wider than the photo on all sides. Photos must have a securely attached hanger ( $\frac{3}{4}$ " binder clip acceptable). Photos submitted that are framed, behind glass or lacking a hanger will not be displayed or judged.
- Photo 1:** Portrait photo of an individual or a group of people showing typical traits of photos taken around 1900 (modest clothing, rigid pose, no smiles, serious expression.) **Print in black and white or sepia tones.**
- Photo 2:** Portrait photo of the same subjects in Photo 1 showing traits of photos taken in 2023 (casual clothes, relaxed pose, lots of smiles.) **Print in colour.**
